

popular that writing fiction became as absorbing an activity as his medical career. ‘Medicine is my wife but literature is my mistress.’ By the time he died at the early age of 44, he had produced over 200 short stories — a body of work that permanently altered the form and profoundly influenced all of the writers who followed him: Joyce, Woolf, Faulkner, you name ‘em. His fiction is celebrated for its economy, penetrating psychology, and amazing empathy. He is, in short, the Shakespeare of short fiction. If I could take only two writers to a desert island, I would choose Shakespeare and Chekhov without a moment’s hesitation.”

We’ll be using the Norton Critical Edition of Chekhov’s short stories which you’ll find for sale at Amazon & abebooks.com.

Social Action

Please come to the letter-writing table today to sign letters to your state legislators regarding a bill to end mandatory minimum sentences. Mandatory sentencing requires judges to impose long predetermined prison terms, even if they believe that a different form of punishment would be more appropriate for a particular individual and better for public safety. The present laws are not conducive to rehabilitation or to re-entry programs that help former offenders to turn their lives around. A computer will be available for looking up the names and addresses of legislators.
