English as a Second Language (ESL) for Adults

Monday, Feb. 18th & Wed. January 20th ~ 10:00 AM, Perkins Room

Learn or improve your English! The class usually meets on Monday and Wednesday. Students practice speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Topics include general conversation, cooking, and holiday events, as well as grammar and pronunciation. The class is taught by Ann Troise, a member of Arlington Street Church, who has been certified to teach ESL by the Boston Academy of English.

The Wednesdays Literary Salon: Hemingway Professor Alan Helms and Rev. Kim

Wednesday, February 20th ~ 6:00-7:30^{ish}, Frothingham Library

Like most celebrated writers, Hemingway suffered a decline in reputation immediately following his death. In our time, however, he's being rehabilitated, and now it's his short stories that are prized more than his novels. We'll discuss roughly seven short stories per meeting, many of them now considered classics of the genre: "A Clean, Well-Lighted Place," "Hills Like White Elephants," "The Snows of Kilimanjaro," and "Big Two-Hearted River." Our text is the collection *In Our Time*, which you can find for pennies at abebooks.com or at the library. We'll also read from a hand-out, which you can pick up on the chairs behind the pulpit.

Professor Alan strongly recommends that you read all the stories as soon as you can and then reread them for our meetings. Of all the literary genres, the short story is closest to the lyric poem, in that it's highly concentrated and aims for one main overall dramatic effect. As anyone familiar with poetry knows, it's impossible to "get" a poem on a single reading; ditto a short story. This is especially true of Hemingway, who said that a good story should be like an iceberg with only one tenth showing above the water. The powerful part of the story, in his theory, isn't visible, which means that Hemingway isn't an immediately accessible writer. He definitely bears rereading.

The New Jim Crow ~ An Arlington Street Reading Group

Sundays, Feb. 24th, March 17th, & April 7th ~ 12:30-2:30 PM, Clarke Room

Join a group to discuss Michelle Alexander's book, *The New Jim Crow*, the Unitarian Universalist Association's (UUA) common read of the year (meaning many congregations across the country will be reading this book together). The UU curriculum will provide the framework for the discussions. We will explore Alexander's call for building a spiritual movement to dismantle the new Jim Crow, and consider how we might begin the work. A quote from the author: "What has changed since the collapse of Jim Crow has less to do with the basic structure of our society than the language we use to justify it. In the era of colorblindness, it is no longer justifiable to use race. So we don't. Rather than rely on race, we use our criminal justice system to label people of color "criminals," and then engage in all the practices we supposedly left behind."
