On Thursday, please plan to sit down to dinner in the Arlington Street Zoom room with Arlington Street's archivist and historian, Holly Hendricks. But first ... this Sunday! Highlights include Yulia Yun playing pieces by Clara Schumann (piano) and *When You're Smiling* (organ!). Rev. Joanna Lubkin sings *Where Do We Come From*?; Hana Omori and her father, Kazuhiro Omori, sing Into the Unknown from Frozen 2; Daniel Rosensweig sings Bobby McFerrin's *The 23rd Psalm*; and Director of Music Mark David Buckles and Julie Metcalf sing the Indigo Girls' *Closer to Fine*. Two updates:

1. Thanks to Laura Pattison, who reports that Beloved Conversations, a program for Unitarian Universalists seeking to embody racial justice as a spiritual practice, is off to a great start! Participants have received their first of six lessons; "Faithful Practice, Nourishment, and Ancestors" includes videos, activities, and additional resources. They were also assigned to "learning pods" and met with them this past week. In addition, Meaning Making sessions for BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) participants have begun; those for white participants begin soon. Thanks to Arlington Street's Transformation Team for Racial Justice and to the Prudential Committee, our governing board, for this good work!

2. Jon Andersen-Miller, Chair of our Restoration Committee, writes that he received inquiries about why the soil is being tested under my parking space at the church. Here's his explanation, verbatim: "So they're doing soil testing for stairs, ramp, and paving, to see how to engineer the foundations so they don't sink ... being that the Back Bay is landfill on swamp (they basically find layers of Needham clay, then gravel, then pilings). I wish I could say they're tapping a new oil well." I laughed, but it turns out he was serious; Jon reports that "Beverly Hills High School has an active oil well in their sports field, disguised behind some architectural folly. It actually funds many of their budgets!"
