A Note on Today's Cantata

This Easter, the Arlington Street Choir is diving headfirst into the struggle between life and death with Johann Sebastian Bach's masterpiece *Christ lag in Todesbanden* (Christ Lay in Death's Bonds). The 8-movement cantata will be performed by choir, string quintet, and organ. The lyrics, penned by Martin Luther himself, acknowledge a world of pain and wrong, yet lead ultimately to a celebration of hope and hallelujahs.

The piece was likely composed in 1707 and is one of Bach's earliest existing cantatas. It is based upon a chorale tune (a hymn) that would have been familiar to congregants at the time, which, in turn, is based on an 11th century Easter chant, *Victimae Paschali Laudes*. Widespread congregational singing was one of the reforms initiated largely by Martin Luther. Bach weaves the hymn melody through every single movement of the cantata, often in long notes while the other voices dance around it in a faster polyphony.

The piece begins with a brief but emotionally-charged sinfonia (as an aside, sinfonias were short introductory instrumental movements which later inspired composers to write "symphonies" which were entirely instrumental!).

Following this, the movements are arranged symmetrically: chorus-duet-solo-chorus-solo-duet-chorus. The central choral movement focuses on one of the central themes of Easter: the battle between life and death. All the movements are in the same key: E minor. This tonality, and the overarching presence of the chorale tune, give a unity and solidity that transcends the variations in style and affect movement to movement.

Now, a note on the text. Unitarian Universalists offen shy away from discussions of sin. We tend not to want to focus on our wrongdoings, and we tend not to believe in a theology that one person's suffering is necessary to redeem another's guilt. We celebrate Jesus for his life, rather than for his death. And we honor his teachings, rather than his miracles.

And I think it's perfectly valid to listen to this music without thinking about the words and be moved deeply by its transcendent beauty.

But let me offer at least one potential way into this story and the words. In a world undeniably full of wrong, perhaps an acknowledgement of the presence of sin can ask us to pause pointing fingers, and to see how we too might be contributing to wrongdoing, to acknowledge where we have also fallen short, and thus hopefully charge us to actively work to make things better.

Rather than being uniquely rescued by one person, Unitarian Universalism calls upon all of our divine power to collectively save one another, that we may we all may emerge from the darkness and offer each of our lights to the world.

As we travel together through this season of resurrection, I hope that this music from long ago can help us find comfort; there has always been pain and struggle, but that there has also always been life, and celebration, and rebirth. I hope this cantata may serve as both a catharsis and a balm.
