At 7:00 this coming Thursday evening, December 1st, please meet Rev. Beth and me in front of the church (20 Arlington Street) for our second annual visit to the Holiday Tree Lighting! We'll open the Zoom room as the in-person group heads for the Boston Common. This year marks the 105th anniversary of the Halifax Explosion. Rescuers from Boston were first on the scene and the last to leave. This is Nova Scotia's annual thank-you gift: This past Wednesday evening, a 45-foot white spruce was felled on the shores of the Bras d'Or Lake in the Cape Breton community on Christmas Island and is making its way to Boston. The Townsend family, on whose land the tree grew, says, "We are grateful to Boston and beyond excited to be a part of such a wonderful tradition. We feel this is going to bring a lot of happiness to the surrounding communities. The tree is such a special gesture of gratitude, hope, and continuing friendship."

At 7:55 p.m., Mayor Michelle Wu will "flip the switch" and the giant tree will be illuminated with 7,000 lights. At the same moment, more than 80 trees in the Public Garden will come on for the season. *Let's be together and make these days merry and bright*!
