Behind the Kitchen Doors ~ An ASC Reading Group

In *Behind the Kitchen Door*, author Saru Jayaraman reveals how restaurant workers live on some of the lowest wages in America. The book explores how poor working conditions—discriminatory labor practices, exploitation, and unsanitary kitchens—affect the meals that arrive at our restaurant tables.

Behind the Kitchen Door is this year's Unitarian Universalist's (UU) common read. It makes visible the lives of people who are subject to discrimination and oppression based on economic status, race, ethnicity, gender, and/or immigration status.
