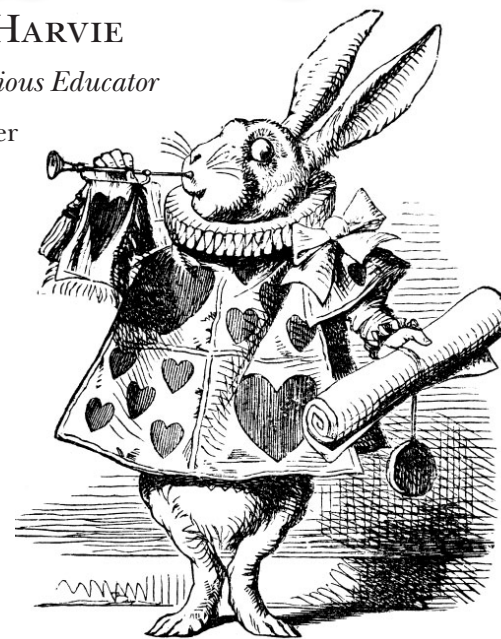

MUSIC *(Continued)*

A Note on Our Performance of Bach's Easter Oratorio

Sunday, April 4th ~ 11:00 AM, Sanctuary

Unitarian Universalism draws its teachings, its worship, and its disciples from religions all over the world and theologies as diverse as I can imagine. But perhaps more than any other religion, the roots of our Unitarian Universalist faith come from the historical tradition of Protestant Christianity. This April 4th, we honor part of our tradition and our faith by celebrating Easter, a holiday of strength, hope, and resurrection, with a piece of music by one of the greatest masters the Western world has ever known, Johann Sebastian Bach.

Bach's Easter Oratorio tells the story of Jesus's apostles coming to his tomb on the third day after his death, finding it empty, and struggling to understand the mystery of what that could mean. The emotions within are a microcosm of the final days of Jesus's life: pain, sorrow, and yearning, followed by praise, and finally, thanks. Unlike Bach's Passions and the Christmas Oratorio, there is no text from the Gospel, though the four soloists are identified as characters in the Gospel narrative: Peter; John; Mary, daughter of James; and Mary Magdalene.

It is perhaps befitting a Unitarian Universalist performance of this Easter piece that its origins were anything but sacred. Bach composed many pieces of celebratory music during his time in Leipzig, many of which were Birthday Odes for members of the ruling family. As these pieces were destined to receive only one performance, it is not surprising that Bach was determined to find a new home for some of the large-scale choral and orchestral movements into which he had put so much creative effort. Thus it was that the Easter Oratorio started its life as a secular birthday cantata for the Duke of Sachs-Weißenfels and was first performed on February 23, 1725.

It is quite possible that Bach planned his composition as destined for the church from the start, as very soon afterward, the music reappeared with a new, sacred, text as the cantata on Easter Sunday, April 1st 1725, where the original festival scoring was equally appropriate. Some scholars believe that the new text was also planned early, and postulate Picander (the Leipzig poet who provided Bach with so many cantata texts as well as the St. Matthew Passion text) as its author. The piece in its present form is the result of several recompositions, as Bach continued to rework the piece well into the late 1740s. Today, the Easter Oratorio stands as one of his many resplendent masterworks.
