March 16th, 23rd, and 31st ~ Returning April 6th

Our intern minister, Catie Scudera, has just left for India as an "ambassador" from the Unitarian Universalist Partner Church Council. She and her spouse, Cole, will spend some time touring and visiting old friends in Delhi, Agra, and Rajasthan, but will spend most of their time in northeast India. In the Khasi Hills of Meghalaya, 10,000 Unitarians live and worship together. Catie spent eight months in the Khasi Hills the year before she began seminary at Harvard Divinity School, and is visiting the project she cofounded there, the A. Margaret Barr Children's Village. Currently, 20 children and two full-time caretakers live at the orphanage, and 10 prominent leaders of the Unitarian Union of Northeast India act as an oversight committee.
