

## Living in the Cave: Addiction and Shame with Peg O'Connor

Plato's famous allegory of the cave is a way to understand some dimensions of addiction, relapse, and recovery. As useful as the allegory may be, it does raise an important question: Why are some people in the cave in the first place?
