## The Wednesdays: Ovid's Metamorphoses, or The Book of Transformations

If a literary classic is a work that has survived the test of time, Ovid's Metamorphoses is one of the greatest classics ever. Published in the year 8 CE and spanning a period from the creation of the world to the deification of Julius Caesar, the book has been wildly popular for over two thousand years. Its happy readers number in the millions, and it has exerted enormous influence on subsequent great artists, inducing Dante, Boccaccio, Chaucer, Titian, Tintoretto, da Vinci, Michelangelo, Caravaggio, and Rembrandt. The Metamorphoses was Shakespeare's favorite book, and our favorite playwright would be unrecognizable without benefit of his Roman predecessor.

Two things probably account for Ovid's enduring popularity: his gifts as a great poet and his ability to tell spell-binding stories. We'll deal with the specifics of the poetry in class; as for the stories, we'll follow the sexual escapades of Jupiter as he abducts the beautiful Europa in the guise of a bull, has his way with Leda in the form of a swan, and seduces Danae as a shower of gold. We'll follow Narcissus's transformation from a beautiful youth to a flower that heralds the advent of spring; Hercules in his twelve labors; Jason on his quest for the Golden Fleece; and Pygmalion as he brings to life the ivory statue who becomes his wife. Famous lovers abound: Venus and Adonis, Pyramus and Thisbe, Jason and Medea, Orpheus and Eurydice, Apollo and Hyacinth, and many, many more.

This course also gives you a bigger bang for your buck (even though it's free) since, in addition to the pleasure of our reading, it also serves as an introduction to Greek and Roman mythology. Few books yield as much sheer joy as the Metamorphoses. All are welcome to join the fun! Required translation: Ovid Metamorphoses translated by Rolfe Humphries, Indiana University Press (Amazon has over 200 used copies starting at a penny each).


