- Uncover what is really happening in Haiti
- Expose the government and non-profits, which have done very little, if anything of importance
- Educate people and raise support for projects in Haiti

A hundred years ago, 99% of all English language poetry published was metered (meaning you can count the beat by rapping it out on a tabletop) and rhymed, with the remaining 1% written in free verse. Today, the percentages are reversed: 99% free verse, 1% formal. Robert Frost was probably the last internationally famous American poet who wrote formal poetry. He famously said that in his view, writing free verse was like playing tennis without a net."
