And who, after all, Would credit what its vague head Must in dreams recall— How it long looked down On the backs of dinosaurs Shadowed by its crown?

This last stanza, which suddenly transports us back millions of years to a time when the modest horsetail was a gigantic plant towering over dinosaurs, is a typical Wilbur maneuver: a shift of perspective that inspires wonder & awe. If you like these two poems, you'll love the four weeks we'll spend with him. All welcome, all aboard!

In June, a group of active members of Arlington Street Church met to explore the question of how we could work together to lead our congregation in becoming a more inclusive and multicultural community. We now propose an ongoing working group involving study and action called *Building the World We Dream About*, a newly-developed Unitarian Universalist (UU) curriculum. The program is designed to enable UU congregations to become more welcoming of racial, ethnic, and cultural diversity, and to dismantle racism in congregations and in the larger community. Curriculum goals are:

The Wednesdays Literary Salon: Richard Wilbur

Four consecutive Wednesday evenings: September 19^{th} and 26^{th} ; October 3^{rd} and $10^{th} \sim 6:00-8:00$ PM, Frothingham Library

Please join Professor Alan Helms and Rev. Kim for another delightful series at The Wednesdays, Arlington Street's literary salon! All are welcome!

Alan writes.

For the past 60 years, Richard Wilbur has arguably been our best formal American poet. By "formal," I only mean a poet who uses meter and rhyme. A hundred years ago, 99% of all English language poetry published was metered (meaning you can count the beat by rapping it out on a tabletop) and rhymed, with the remaining 1% written in free verse. Today, the percentages are reversed: 99% free verse, 1% formal. Robert Frost was probably the last internationally famous American poet who wrote formal poetry. He famously said that in his view, writing free verse was like playing tennis without a net.

He had a point, which we'll discuss in our four meetings devoted to Richard Wilbur. If his name is unfamiliar to you, you'll get a firm feel for his poetry from this small, playful poem called "Museum Piece" written (I'm guessing) around 1950:

The good grey guardians of art

Patrol the halls on spongy shoes,

Impartially protective, though

Perhaps suspicious of Toulouse.

Here dozes one against the wall,

Disposed upon a funeral chair.

A Degas dancer pirouettes

Upon the parting of his hair.

See how she spins! The grace is there,

But strain as well is plain to see.

Degas loved the two together:

Beauty joined to energy.

Edgar Degas purchased once

A fine El Greco, which he kept

Against the wall beside his bed

To hang his pants on while he slept.

And here sixty years later is a poem that appeared in The New Yorker just last year, titled "Horsetail:"

It grows anywhere.

This jointed stalk, with branches

Like green floating hair.

Thrives in ditches and

Trackside gravel, and even

In oil-spattered sand.

Careless of all that,

Carciess of all that,

Its foot-high grace enhances

Any habitat.

Like a proud exile,

It will not boast that elsewhere

It lived in high style;
