Pärt's musical revelation came in the early 1970's during the Kruschev-era of Soviet censorship, and in the midst of several other personal struggles: the annunciation of his faith into the Eastern Orthodox Church, his marriage to his wife Nora, and their relocation to Berlin. Soviet censors had placed a ban on a large portion of his early works, and he fell silent for several years. Pärt came to a cathartic release after experiencing and studying the Franco-Flemish music of the Renaissance and Gregorian plainchant, emerging with a completely new compositional voice that has won the hearts of many dedicated followers across the world.

His Berliner Messe, composed in 1990 for SATB soloists and organ (later revised for SATB chorus and string orchestra), is his second setting of the Mass Ordinary, and a spectacular example of his timeless compositional method of tintinnabulation used in a liturgical framework. Pärt's melodic language, attention to text setting, observance of Hesychasm (stillness, quiet, silent prayer), and iconographical painting of the liturgy, culminates in this 25-minute masterpiece, filling our ears (and our hearts) with praise, celebration, and peace.



TODAY'S MUSIC

Arvo Pärt's Berliner Messe

Arvo Pärt, born in Estonia on September 11, 1935, is one of today's most celebrated composers of sacred music. Often referred to as "holy minimalism," his music has connected with listeners worldwide through its simplicity and sublimity.

Although his earliest compositional roots were in neo-classical and serial styles (akin to that of Schoenberg, Prokofiev, and Shostakovich), it is the latter output of his musical career that has led to his international success and fame. Pärt's musical language, known as "tintinnabulation" (Latin for "little bells"), fuses the two most innate resources for the composer: the scale and triad. He does so in such a delicate and conscious way that it transcends the boundaries of time, creating a new music that moves beyond our musical biases and touches the very core of our humanity.
