Former Arlington Street Minister Receives Award

Rev. Farley Wheelwright and posthumously, his spouse Virginia Wheelwright, just received the 2013 Creative Sag-ing Award. Rev. Wheelwright was the Interim Minister at Arlington Street during the ministerial search for Rev. Kim.

The Creative Sag-ing Award recognizes outstanding service and creativity in pursuing new ventures after retirement and building on one's experience in creative ways. After retiring from the ministry, the Wheelwrights remained prominent voices for social justice at General Assembly. They later moved to Mexico where Farley was active in the ministry at San Miguel UU Church for many years. Farley also rebuilt the library collection in the town to become the second largest English-language library in Mexico. He later worked to improve the water service to poor residents outside the town.
