As I write this evening, George Floyd's murderer has been convicted. It is a rare moment of justice for a Black man in the United States of America. Over 65 years ago, in September of 1955, Emmett Till's mother, Mamie Till Bradley, insisted on a public funeral service with an open casket after her only child was kidnapped, tortured, and murdered by two white men. It took an all-white jury a mere 67 minutes of deliberation to acquit them. Across a half-century, Dr. King's words ring in our ears: "Change does not roll in on the wheels of inevitability, but comes through continuous struggle.... Now let us begin. Now let us rededicate ourselves to the long and bitter—but beautiful—struggle for a new world."

This Sunday morning, Yulia Yun opens the service with *Lean On Me, You've Got A Friend*, and *Shower the People*. Ann-Marie Iacoviello sings the traditional African American Yonder *Come Day* and Rachel Platten's *Stand By You*; Hana Omori sings *Chico Gospel* and *Light of a Clear Blue Morning* (Dolly Parton!); and Director of Music Mark David Buckles and Julie Metcalf sing *Why Worry*? and Fleetwood Mac's *Don't Stop*. Yulia closes the service reprising *Don't Stop*... on the organ! Patrick Cooleybeck is our worship coordinator. My sermon is called Improving on Job.

But first ... I'll see you Saturday night at 7:00!
